

Chaplain's Corner, Hughes Camp Chaplain Richard W Rudd



Time, referred to as the fourth dimension, was viewed by the Aztecs as moving in a circular or cyclical rather than a linear pattern, progressing up through the ages in a spiral formation. As archeology reveals, each civilization is built and rests upon the ashes of another, layer upon

layer. "A generation goes, and a generation comes..." "What has been is what will be, and what has been done is what will be done..." (Eccles. 1:4.9)

We can never factor in the unknown and unexpected to our most carefully designed plans of how to live our lives. There will still be times when we feel we are wandering and stumbling through life without a map or strategy, tripping over unforeseen obstacles in our way, straying down meaningless rabbit trails, ending up in disappointing deadends, sometimes wandering up and down the passages of a maze, sometimes going in circles, always needing to review our plans—our hopes, dreams, ambitions, our way and understanding of the meaning of life. While we do not have the advantage of being able to foresee future events, we are not left destitute. We do have at our disposal knowledge of the experiences, the choices, trials and tribulations, even ultimate fates of those who have made the pilgrimage of life through this world before us to guide us in charting our course into the unknown. As Abraham told Dives, "They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them." (Lk. 16L29) We not only have Moses and the prophets, but also the apostles and Christ. knowledge gleaned from history and our own experiences is not enough. We have need of wisdom, that which gives us the ability to know how to make the best use of the knowledge we have accumulated. In our guest for wisdom, we are told, "The fear (trust in and reverence) of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom..." (Prov. 9:10) The study of history also teaches us that apart from God, and left to our own devices, true wisdom and the most beneficial use of knowledge is impossible.

As time continues its march, we follow in the footsteps and stand in the places of our predecessors,

if not physically, then certainly spirituality. The Roman Empire was a builder of roads and in those days it was said that all roads led to Rome. Spiritually, we traverse various roads through life, occasionally arriving at forks and crossroads where we make those momentous decisions about which way our lives are to go. At some intersections in our journey, we enter upon the Emmaus Road, following Cleopas and his travelling companion. Like them, we have also heard the stories "(c)oncerning Jesus of Nazareth, Who was ...mighty in deed..., crucified...,"and how "(t)hey were at the tomb...and did not find His body: and ...that they had seen...angels, who said that He was alive." (Lk. 24:19-23) At some point along the way we also encounter the resurrected Christ as "...Jesus Himself (draws) near and (goes) with (us)." (Lk. 24:165) "And, ...He interprets to (us) in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself." (Lk. 24:27) We hear the Gospel. Then, as suddenly as "...the Spirit of the Lord caught up Philip..." (Acts 8:39) on the road between Jerusalem and Gaza and transported him to Azotus, we find ourselves transported to Caesarea Philippi standing in the place of Peter where Christ asks us, "But Who do you say that I am?" (Matt. 16:15) This is the most important question we will ever be asked; the most important decision we will ever make. It will determine our eternal destination. Those who reject Christ will find all roads lead away from Him, paved with hearts hardened against the love of God. "Simon Peter replied, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." (Matt. 16:16) As all roads for the inhabitants of the empire led to Rome, all roads for the citizens of Christ's kingdom, those who answer as Peter did, lead to the New Jerusalem, that city "...not made with hands, eternal in the heavens..." (II Cor. 5:1), as Shakespeare wrote. "...from whose shore no traveler returns."

Even as Christians, we must continue our trek through what the Scottish poet James Montgomery in The Issues of Life and Death called "this vale of tears" or what Oliver W. Holmes called in The Iron Gate "this vale of sorrows." It was on the way of the Cross, the Via Dolorosa or sorrowful way, that Simon of Cyrene had "...laid on him the Cross, to carry it behind Jesus." (Lk. 23:26)

In the footsteps of Simon, we who also follow Christ must bear the cross of life's trials, and if required, of ridicule, persecution, and martyrdom. We find the strength to endure by taking our place in the Cenacle or Upper Room where Christ takes and gives to us the bread and wine and says, "Take; this is My body. This is My blood..." (Mk. 14:22)

There is much debate about the exact location of Calvary, Golgotha, or "...the place that is called The Skull..." (Lk. 23:33) Wherever we stop to consider the prospect or confront the imminent event of death, for those we love or ourself, we find ourselves at the foot of the Cross. There, where the man was crucified beside Christ, we issue our final plea, "Jesus, remember me when You come in Your kingdom." (Lk. 23:42) We commit our souls into His care and are comforted by His promise, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise." (Lk, 23:43)

When Peter and John learned Christ was no longer in the tomb, "...they went toward the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple outran Peter...but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter...went into the tomb... Then the other disciple...also went in..." (Jn. 20:3) in the hope of finding Christ. Christ has said, "Enter by the narrow gate... For the gate is narrow...that leads to life..." (Matt. 7:13) The grave is a narrow gate through which we all must pass, the final path we spiritually tread following in the way of Peter, John, and Christ to experience life in eternity and encounter the resurrected Lord. Like Peter, some of us will enter before others. But also like John, all of us are reminded that "...it is appointed for men to die once..." (Heb. 9:27) The sun rises and...goes down, and hastens to the place where it rises. The wind blows...round and round. All streams run...to the place where...they flow again. (T)he dust (our body) returns to the earth...and the spirit (our soul) returns to God Who gave it." (Eccles. 1:5-7, 12:7) It is then that we will end our journey standing in the place of Thomas with all of the other disciples who have preceded us and Christ will appear, show us His hands and His side and say, "Put your finger here, and see My hands; and put out your hand, and place it in My side..." And we will respond as Thomas, "My Lord and my God! (Jn. 20:27)
