# Message from Boyd Chapter Commander Steve Ferguson

#### Compatriots,

### **Philosophy vs True Story**

John Hicks George is my great, great grandfather. He was a Q-man. He rode with Quantrill on numerous occasions. Before the start of the WBTS, he married Lavisa White, a sister of his brother's wife. His brother was Hiram George. John and Lavisa had an infant son. Therefore, John Hicks wanted to sit out the WBTS. But after his parent's home was burned on June 12, 1862, he rode South with Quantrill planning to intercept and enlist with Colonel Hays' 2nd Missouri Cavalry. In route, on July 10 of 1862, at Pleasant Hill, the Q-men were engaged by the Federals. In that battle on Sorency's Farm, the "Battle of the Ravines", his brother-in-law Ezra Moore was killed. John Hicks returned home soon after.

On August 15, 1862, a Federal scouting group came upon John Hicks in his field. They did not know he was with Quantrill only weeks before. They demanded to know where Quantrill was. He gave no answer. He was "strung up" three times for his silence. As the Federals rode away on that last time, cursing his stubbornness, his wife and sister ran out and cut him down just in time to revive him. (I have a piece of the tree limb with my great, great grandmother's writing taped to it.). When John Hicks recovered, he rejoined Quantrill. He rode with his brother Hiram and Lieutenant William Gregg throughout the rest of the WBTS. First with Quantrill and then with Shelby until he was finally captured in 1864. (My grandmother, his granddaughter, told me of her grandfather showing her the rope burns on his neck.)

There is a saying - people may argue with your philosophy, but they never can argue with your personal story. I encourage you to tell your stories often. It is important for those who do not

# Chaplain's Corner, Hughes Camp Chaplain Richard W Rudd



Growing up in the country and living close to the earth teaches many valuable lessons that form one's character and last a lifetime. Memories of the wheat harvest recall that when the grain was taken to the mill for sale, a man would insert a tube into the grain, remove a sample, and check for weed content. The higher the weed

content, the less one was paid for the grain.

Christ told a parable about a man who sowed seeds for a wheat crop in his field. (Matt. 13:24) Afterward, while people were sleeping, the man's enemy came and sowed weeds in the field. The laborers for the man who owned the field were alarmed at the appearance of the weeds and were anxious to deal with the problem.

The traditional interpretation of this parable is that the field is the world. The sower of the good seed is Christ Who distributes blessings. The laborers are Christians who do God's will. The sower of the bad seed is Satan and his followers who do mischief when Christians are not vigilant. However, there are other applications of this parable that teach the same lesson.

St. Paul, speaking to a crowd in Athens, said, "And He (God) made from one every nation of men to live on all the face of the earth, having determined allotted periods and the boundaries of the habitations..." (Acts 17:26) The nations are political entities within which men live and determine their nationality. Thus, America is a field in which God sows the seeds of His blessings in our land. Numerous Founding Fathers acknowledged this truth. Washington, referring to the Revolution, testified, "The hand of Providence has been so conspicuous in all this..." Franklin, regarding the Constitutional Convention, observed, "...I have so much faith in general government of the world by Providence that I can hardly conceive a transaction of such momentous importance...without being in some degree influenced, guided, and governed by that...Ruler in Whom all inferior spirits live, and move, and have their being, " a reference to the words of St. Paul. (Acts 17:28)

The sower of the weeds is Satan and those "...following the prince of the power of the air, the

spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience." (Eph. 2:2) These are people found on the secular left among members of the media, Hollywood, corporate executives, educators, politicians, publishers, and unions. The weeds they sow are numerous: globalism, socialism, evolution, abortion, revisionist history, relativism, miscegenation, homosexuality, and defamation of our Founding Fathers and Confederate heroes. They ignore a dire warning. "God is not mocked, for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap." (Eph. 6:7) The seeds they sow plant chaos and what they will reap is tyranny. Franklin assured, "Only virtuous people are capable of freedom. As nations become corrupt and vicious, they have more need of masters." John Adams noted, "Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of another."

The laborers who assist in sowing the good seed are Christians and patriots of every generation of Americans who value life, defend freedom and nationalism, promote capitalism (II Thess. 3:10), preserve true history, guard traditional marriage and family, and practice Judaeo-Christian morality.

The weeds are sown when good men sleep. This sleep or lack of attentiveness can assume various forms: distractions associated with entertainment or materialism, fake news, low morale, or just unconsciously following the herd. We are asleep on the job when we fail to be vigilant and Jefferson warned, "The price of freedom is eternal vigilance."

St. Paul urged, "Fight the good fight of the faith..." (I Tim. 6:12) Role models of the courage needed abound. Abraham rescued his nephew Lot from his Moses stood up to Pharaoh. captors. (Gen. 4) (Ex. 5-12) Joshua and Caleb did not fear the Nephilim. (Num. 13) John the Baptist rebuked Herod. (Matt. 14) Christ called the Scribes and Pharisees In America, the Founding Favipers. (Matt. 23) thers stood up to the British Empire and our Confederate ancestors resisted the tyranny of big government. As if describing the times in which we live, St. Paul observed, "For the mystery of lawlessness is already at work; only He Who restrains it will do so until He is out of the way." (II. Thess. 2:7) The Restrainer is the Holy Spirit Who indwells each Christian. He is the sower of good seed and we are charged to be instruments of the Holy Spirit fighting the good fight of the faith against Satan and his minions who are sowing weeds in our land.


