## Chaplain's Corner, Hughes Camp Chaplain Richard W Rudd



David in his familiar Psalm 23 wrote, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil; for Thou (God) art with me; Thy rod and Thy staff, they comfort me." David speaks not of actually experiencing death or defeat, but of the shadow, the imminent challenge and threat, the prospect of their reality,

that looms before us. Numerous incidents cause all of us to pass repeatedly through stressful low points of crisis and dark times of danger in our lives. Harold Kushner wrote a book entitled When Bad Things Happen To Good People. The incidents to which I refer are not the result of our own dereliction, but rather are imposed on us either personally or collectively by others or unavoidable circumstances.

In a global community that has become increasingly more connected since the advent of the 20th century, mankind has experienced the threats of two world wars, the dawn of the atomic age, and most recently, the Wuhan virus. As a nation, we Americans have contended with threatening situations from the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the WBTS, The Great Depression, the Viet Nam era, and the 9/11 terrorist attack. Local communities deal with natural disasters ranging from tornados and hurricanes to forest fires, earthquakes, and volcanos like Mt. St. Helens. Families struggle with financial burdens, spousal conflicts, difficulties raising children, illnesses and death. As individuals, we experience our own personal crises. Even if there might be those who would accompany us through such stressful times, limitations might prevent their good intentions. Ultimately, there are some issues with which only we can come to terms; we must walk through the valley of the shadow of death alone, either to find an external solution or mental resolution and peace of mind.

Throughout world history, there have existed those possessed by a tyrannical nature who are not content to co-exist peacefully with those different from themselves. They, whether the ruler of a nation, supervisor at work, or schoolyard bully, seek total emasculation or obliteration of those they victimize. Currently, we witness this being done by Russia against the Ukraine, China against Taiwan, Iran against Israel, the secular left against conservatives and Christians, and the revived "reconstruction" of Confederate descendants.

Just because we do not win every battle does not have to mean we have lost the war. While we might be outmaneuvered, outgunned, and physically subjected, as the CSA was by the North, we are not totally conquered until our spirit and will are broken. Physical attacks seek to conquer the body; psychological warfare seeks to conquer the mind and soul. The objective is to demoralize the victim to the point of not only losing hope and totally surrendering, but also to forget incrementally one succeeding generation at a time. Such dementia is psychological death. Thus, for practical reasons, the victim of the tyrannical bully ceases to exist.

Biblical examples of people traversing the valley of the shadow of death are numerous. In the Book of Esther, Haman, the Persian king's most powerful man, sought to destroy Mordecai and all his fellow Jews. But Mordecai and Esther persevered and Haman was hanged from the gallows he had prepared for Mordecai. In the Book of Daniel, we are told the story of Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael, and Azeriah, who were exiles in Babylon. In an effort to erase even their identity, their names were changed to Belteshazzar, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. Daniel refused to stop praying to God and the three young men refused to worship a golden image. Daniel was cast into the lions' den and the others into a fiery furnace, yet all four survived. Other notable examples that also survived their trials in less miraculous ways include David attacked by King Saul (I Sam. 18), Joseph victimized by his own brothers and Potiphar's wife (Gen. 37), and of course, Job. None of them wavered in their trust in God, lost consciousness of their personal identity, or compromised their convictions. They continued to walk with confidence in the shadow of physical threats and psychological intimidation.

The trials we endure can divide or unite us, disillusion or motivate us, defeat or strengthen and steel us. How we choose to respond can determine the difference and give us some control over our circumstances. While our adversaries are motivated by irrational fanaticism, sometimes unfocused, fueled by fear and animosity, we can respond with dedication focused on a noble cause energized by courage and hope if we know with certainty what

we believe and why we believe it. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart; and lean not on your own understanding." (Prov. 3:5) This is how David in Psalm 23 could say "...I fear no evil..." This is why over the millenniums of history Jews and Christians have been so resilient, so difficult to conquer and impossible to eradicate.

St. Paul suffered many trials for the purpose of disseminating the Gospel. He uses the analogy of running a race (I Cor. 9:24), a reference to the Isthmian Games, second only to the Olympics, held in Corinth every three years. Competitors would spend ten months in intense training, exercising self-discipline and restraint in dieting and other applications of temperance and self-denial. So we must prepare ourselves for the trials we must expect in life, endeavoring to keep the flesh subject to the spirit, educating ourselves, and maintaining a holy fear of ourselves by not acquiescing to our weaknesses and negative inclinations, not falling prey to presumptuous over-confidence, and keeping focused on our target.

While it can only be fully understood in retrospect, sometimes bad things happen to good people for their own edification and the benefit of others. Trials can strengthen us in our confidence, courage, and resolve. Like pain, they can awaken our attention to greater dangers and save us from the brink of disaster. And, not all is lost if we learn from our mistakes and their consequences. This is why Joseph could tell his brothers who sold him into Egyptian slavery, "...(Y)ou meant evil against me; but God meant it for good..." (Gen. 50:20) St. Paul assures us, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." (Rom. 8:28)



Compatriots,

As we begin the New Year, thank you for joining the Sons of Confederate Veterans, Missouri Division, and for your continued membership. Our ancestors need our membership more now than ever. The U. S. Government has forever broken reconciliation with our people, families, and ancestors. Congress and the Department of Defense have entered the Arlington National Cemetery to remove the North and South Reconciliation Monument.
