
Message from Commander Sam Stanton



All of us are experiencing constant change that is accelerating with each passing year. Solomon observed, "A generation goes, and a generation comes..." (Eccles. 1:4) Each generation changes reality; the world and life in it are what each successive generation makes. Generations come and go because "...it is

appointed for men to die once...' (Heb. 9:27) "For the living know that they will die, ... but the memory of them is lost." (Eccles. 9:5)

Scripture is replete with reminders of the transient nature of life in this world. David said, "Man is like a breath, his days are like a passing shadow." He lamented that we "...wither away like grass." (Ps. 144:4, 102:11) Job agreed and further stated, "As the cloud fades and vanishes...", so do our lives. (7:7,9) James tells us, "For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes." (4:14) Solomon wrote, "There is no remembrance of former things, nor will there be remembrance of later things yet to happen among those who come after." He repeated that "... there is no enduring remembrance, seeing that in the days to come all will have been long forgotten." (Eccles. 1:11, 2:16)

Against all of the odds we want to be remembered because God has instilled in us a desire for immortality. Some seek this through their children. But, as generations come and go, they become near genealogical statistics in the family tree to those who have never known them. Others seek immortality through some dramatic act that garners attention and fame only to become an impersonal footnote among the annals of history. After the assassination of JFK, November 22 was noted each year. Now, it is just another day. Recently, bells mournfully tolled for Pope Francis; approximately two weeks later, the same bells rang in celebration of Pope Leo as the memory of Francis fades into the past. Some seek to be remembered by erecting monuments that outlast the remembrance of the one they commemorate. St. Paul said that even though we speak eloquently and say great things, have prophetic powers, understand all mysteries and knowledge, remove mountains, give away our property through donations, or even

make self-sacrifices, "but have not love, (we) gain nothing." "Love never ends;" it is how we form lasting bonds and find immortality. (I Cor. 13:1-3, 8)

Memories are developed and preserved by synapses that serve as the points of contact between adjacent neurons in the brain where nerve impulses are transmitted from one to another. The longer we remember, the stronger the synapses. Weak synapses result in forgetting. The length and depth of how we are remembered are determined by the bonds we form through shared experiences, whether life-fulfilling or life-threatening, with others, especially family and friends. In Christianity, it is through the communion of saints mentioned in the ancient creeds and recitation of the Litany of Saints. We form bonds with people who share the same social and political philosophies. Bonds are also geographical. We might live in the same neighborhood, have the same hometown, or be citizens of the same state or sectional region of the US. Those of us who reside in one of the states of the CSA and in the South can identify with each other. Nationality, be it of the USA or CSA, distinguishes us from others and unites us as one people. Today, more than ever since the end of the WBTS, our personal and collective identities are being attacked because of our religious beliefs, social and political philosophies, and locale in which we live. Due to our assailants' being devoid of love for those they disagree with, immortality through remembrance of our ancestors and ourselves is threatened by editing, revising, and rewriting both current events and history. Our monuments are being desecrated. We are being libeled and silenced by intimidation and censorship. Wherever we go, we leave fingerprints that can be used in court as forensic evidence verifying that we have passed that way. Eventually, our fingerprints are erased as if we had never been there. So it is with being forgotten; it is as if we had never existed.

Brigadier General John T. Hughes Sons of Confederate Veterans Essay Contest Rules

Essay subject: The Morrill Tariff as the Cause of the American Civil War

Contest is open to High School Juniors and Seniors who plan on attending college or a trade school after High School. Or to a student who is enlisting in a branch of the Military after high school.

Contest entries must be submitted typed double spaced, Times New Roman, 12 font, on 8 ½' by 11" paper with 1" margins. Contest offered to High School Juniors or Seniors.

Essay Pages – The essay must:

Minimum of 800 and a maximum of 1,200 words (excluding title page, footnotes, bibliography page and biography. First page must include the Title. No applicant information on essay pages. No graphics, special covers or bindings are allowed. Essay must include a short applicant's autobiography, name, address and phone number.

Biography pages – The bibliography must:

Include a minimum of two references from either published works, encyclopedias or internet sources.

Judging: The essay will be judged for historical accuracy, clarity of thought, organization, grammar and spelling and the writer's summation and opinion of the topic.

Submission: Completed essays shall be submitted to the Brigadier General John T. Hughes Camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans or their designated representative on or before September 1, 2025.

Requirements: \$500 will be awarded for the winning essay. Winner will be required to accept the award at the monthly meeting of the Brigadier General John T. Hughes Camp on the second Thursday of the month located at Zarda BBQ at 6:00 pm in Blue Springs the month following notification of winning the award. Winner will agree to read their winning essay at time of awarding prize. All essays will become the property of the Brigadier General John T. Hughes Camp SCV. The winning essay may be submitted for publication in the Sons of Confederate Veterans newsletter. Applicants for the BGen John T. Hughes Essay agree that the decision of the judges is final and not subject for review.



Keynote Presentation SCV PCIC Larry McCluney, Jr.

Larry Allen McCluney, Jr., is an Instructor of American History at Mississippi Delta Community College and an American Civil War Living Historian since 1995. Based in Greenwood, Mississippi, he is the author of numerous best selling books which have been the topic of historical debate among students and historians.

Additionally, McCluney is currently a member of the nonprofit organization Sons of Confederate Veterans for over 25 years and served as the 76th Commander-in-Chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

McCluney's publications have focused on political, intellectual, and social history of the American Civil War. His bestselling books are The Yazoo Pass Expedition: A Union Thrust into the Delta (Civil War Series) (2017) (ranked bestseller in Military Pictorial History, Reconstruction History of the U.S., and U.S. Civil War Confederate History) and On to Vicksburg!: The Mississippi Central Railroad Campaign (2019). His latest book is, In Defense of General Beauregard (2022).

Larry McCluney has received many awards for historical preservation from the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the United Daughters of the Confederacy as well as numerous other awards.
