#### June 12th Camp Meeting

At our June Camp Meeting, **Mike Calvert** spoke to us about **The Second Battle of Independence.** Mike is the President of the Western Missouri Civil War Roundtable. He does quite a bit of public speaking and also has a presentation he does at the Truman Library. A life long resident of Jackson County, he knows a lot about Jackson County history and the War.

The Second Battle of Independence was part of Price's Raid into Missouri and occurred just prior to and leading up to the Battle of Westport, that ended badly for Price and resulted in a hasty retreat back to Arkansas.

Some of the key leaders for the South were Price, Gen. James Fagan, Gen. Marmaduke and Gen. Shelby. For the Nawth, it was Major Samuell Curtis, BG James Blunt, Maj. Alfred Pleasanton.

Gen. Price had a wagon train 7 miles long he was trying to protect. Curtis was on the west side

of the Big Blue River. Price also had Pleasanton in his rear. Curtis had 15,000 Union Troops. Price needed to take the ford at the Little Blue River to cross his wagon train over. Shelby attacked the main ford and sent Jackman to attack a second ford. Price also needed to hold Pleasanton back who was in his rear.

Curtis advanced his troops to the opposite side of the Little Blue. My notes are vague, but I do think Price got the wagon train across the ford under the direction of Gen. Marmaduke and was able to burn a bridge there also.

Pleasanton soon made contact resulting in a Desperate fight thru the streets of Independence. Sniping from windows etc. The Battle continued into the dark. The blue pushed the Confederates out of town.


The Battle of Westport is often credited as being what was the end of Price's 1864. Mike Calvert contends that the end of the Raid really began at the Second Battle of Independence.

#### Thanks for talking to us Mike!

In other news, on Sept. 21 and 22, Jesse James will be posthumously presented with a Confederate Medal of Honor during the Jesse James Festival. I did not catch who or where this medal will come from, not sure if it is an SCV function or not. There were no actual Confederate Medals of honor before or after the war, However, the UDC did bestow the Confederate Cross of Honor after the war.

Dwayne is related to many famous Confederate Families and he knows a ton about his families history, and there's a lot to know there!

The Ancestor that Dwayne honors on his SCV Certificate is **Private Rice Hughes Holtzclaw of Co. D, 3rd Missouri Cavalry Battalion Dismounted.** Note the middle name of Hughes. Yes, Dwayne is some type of relation to John T. Hughes! Rice was in the Missouri State Guard to start with, then enlisted in the CS Army once Missouri seceded. He fought at Lexington, Sugar Creek, Elk Horn Tavern, then onto Mississippi at Farmington, luka, Corinth, Hatchie Bridge, Bakers Creek, and Big Black, where he was captured. He did survive captivity. I'm not sure when he died but he is buried at Paradise Cemetery in Clay County.
