

Chaplain's Corner, Hughes Camp Chaplain Richard W Rudd



The beginning of a new year is normally a time to assess the effects of past events in order to make resolutions for the future. For those of us who can remember, the decade of the 1960's was a watershed era. As a result of events that have transpired

since then, we find ourselves living on the same planet, but in a vastly different world. I recently made a list of many of those major events; the effects of them on life in America are revolutionary. Those who are born with normal vision consider those who are born blind to be handicapped. Yet, those who have never seen consider their situation normal. Many of us have seen another world and way of life and know the difference. What younger citizens accept as normal, older citizens chafe at the abnormality, tempted to yearn for the time when life was more civilized and we had more independence and privacy, more rights, and more honor.

Many books are written, presentations given, and reenactments performed depicting the glorious days of the Old South, the Confederacy, and the WBTS. Details of historical characters' lives and deeds are reiterated in impressive detail. But, how can knowing how many miles per bushel of oats Lee's horse got help us to improve the world we live in today? Failure to make the transition from the past to the present and demonstrate the practical application of historical facts to current conditions can leave one asking, "So?" We cannot regain lost freedom and honor solely through the historical deeds of others and we cannot return to and relive the past.

Daniel, Ezekiel, Zechariah, John, Paul, and others traveled forward in time to see the future. Nobody ever traveled back in time to the past. Two attempts to do so ended in failure.

When adverse conditions seemed too challenging,

the Israelites glorified the past and yearned for "...when we sat by the fleshpots and ate bread to the full..." (Ex. 16:3) Desiring to return to the past, they said, "For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness." (Ex. 14:12) With slavery a familiar way of life and freedom a new concept, they neglected to apply the lessons learned from the knowledge of how God secured their freedom from Pharaoh to solving the problems they faced in their new circumstances.

God sent to Sodom angels who warned Lot, "Flee for your life; do not look back..." (Gen. 19:17) "But Lot's wife behind him looked back..." perhaps due to apprehension of what lay ahead or affinity for what lay behind. For her, the consequences were fatal. Christ solemnly warns us, "Remember Lot's wife." (Lk. 17:32)

This new year comes with a multitude of problems and adversity that can be intimidating at times. We are advised, "Say not, 'Why were the former days better than these?' For it is not from wisdom that you ask this." (Eccles. 7:10) Knowledge is the accumulation of facts; wisdom is knowing how to use them. Anamnesis, a Greek term, means not only to remember, but to make the effects of past events active in the present. We do not honor our Confederate and Revolutionary forefathers by merely remembering. We honor them by applying the lessons they teach us to the task of discovering solutions to the problems we are confronted with in our age. Christ said, "Nobody who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." (Lk. 17:62) We are meant to be aliens to the past, sojourners in the present, and pilgrims to the future, continuing on the path where St. Paul's footsteps left off, "...forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, (pressing) on toward the mark..." (Phil. 3:13)

Lt. Col. Yeatman to retire from Air Force

After 26 years of service in the US Air Force, Camp Member John Yeatman will be retiring as a Lt. Colonel. John entered the service on August 22nd, 1985 and will officially retire on February 12, 2012. That's really 26 1/2 years! John's last trip to Travis AFB will be this January 9th thru the 13th, and he'll be done!

John entered as an enlisted man and his first assignment was as a gunner on a B-52 at Carswell AFB in Ft. Worth, Texas. That was in the hay day of SAC and the cold war was still going strong. Every month him and his crew would stand what was called "Alert". They slept in a hooch beside their fully fueled and nuked up B-52 ready to scramble at a seconds notice to fly to Russia and send those commie bastards to hell! And of course, that would have been a one way trip for John and his crew, no coming back from that one most likely. So those we're stressful times for our Airmen. They would often be notified to scramble, get the jet spooled up, only to be told that was a drill. Think about that, not knowing if this was really the end or not!

During his time as an enlisted man John used his GI benefits to earn a bachelors degree from Texas Christian University in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area. After graduating John applied for Officer Candidate School and Pilot Training. He was selected and did quite well at OCS and in Pilot Training.

Upon earning his wings, he was assigned to fly the KC-10 Extender, an air to air refueler. None of our bombers or fighters go anywhere without those tankers and the precious fuel. It was a great aircraft to get and he's been all over the world in those KC-10's. For years, John flew out of March AFB in California until that base was more or less shut down. He finished out his Air Force Career in the 79th Air Refueling Squadron at Travis AFB near Sacramento, CA.

Thru out the years he has deployed numerous times in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom, as well as various other hotspots around the world and conflicts. He has earned a rack of medals, which I'm not sure what all exactly, but it's a bunch!

John has made great friends thru his time in the Air Force, but he's also anxious to retire. He's also a pilot for American Airlines and he's looking forward to only having one job and spending time working on our farm.

Congratulations to John on a great career serving our Country and on his retirement! *LTY*

Our speaker this year is **Paul Petersen**, author of three books on Quantrill. Paul retired from the Marines after 26 years of service. He had noticed during his time in the Marines that Marine publications sometimes referred to Quantrill and the tactics Quantrill developed. In the current day service, Quantrill is considered the father of modern guerilla tactics. After retiring, Paul was intrigued by the differences of opinions on Quantrill depending on which side of the Missouri/Kansas border you were on. This led him to want to get the truth out about Quantrill, whatever the truth was. At Quantrill's re-internment in Higginsville in 1993, Paul promised Quantrill he would tell the truth about his feats. Come find out what Paul's research has found out!
